1.0 Foreword

This edition of the Shawnee State University Facts and Figures for 2009-2010 was produced by the Office of Institutional Research and Assessment to provide easy access to information about the institution. The information covers a wide variety of topics that should be sufficient to answer most frequently asked questions about Shawnee State University.

The information for this book was compiled from numerous sources. These sources include the institution's annual responses to the Integrated Post-secondary Educational Data System (IPEDS) project conducted by the National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES). Other data is obtained through the Ohio Board of Regents Higher Education Information (HEI) system. Additional reports are generated using special databases maintained by the Office of Institutional Research and Assessment for longitudinal study purposes.

One note of caution must be offered concerning the data presented in any fact book. The institutional descriptive statistics may vary over time, and therefore differ from other reports. The reasons for this are legitimate: statistics used to profile students, employees, alumni, or other groups of people are only accurate for that moment at which the data were captured. A static number is used to describe a dynamic factor. For example, the actual number of students in a particular major on any given day, other than the date the data was collected, may be higher, lower, or the same as the number reported in this publication. Also, numbers may vary from table to table due to differences in classification definitions for different reports.

These numerical fluctuations have been controlled as much as possible by using institutional reports that are submitted to external agencies on a prescribed schedule, using operational definitions that are accepted by post-secondary institutions for reporting purposes. The numbers reported in this fact book were accurate at the time of data collection, and accurately reflect described characteristics of Shawnee State University. Year-by-year comparisons can be made as the data were collected at the same time period each year and handled in the same fashion each year.

1.1 Data Calculations and Sources

Degrees Granted (Section 4): The number of degrees granted per major between the first summer session and the spring quarter.

Enrollment by Majors (Section 3): Majors are self-reported by students, who may choose to report a change of major at any time. Data is included for full and part time students.

Student FTE (Section 3): Undergraduate and graduate full time equivalents for the semester are calculated by dividing the total number of credit hours by 15. For the academic year, FTE is determined by dividing the total credit hours by 30.

2.0 Profile

2.1 The University

In January of 1975, Shawnee State General and Technical College, created from a merger of the Ohio University regional campus in Portsmouth, Ohio and Scioto Technical College, was chartered by the Ohio Board of Regents to begin operation on July 1, 1975. The college, then operated on two campuses, moved to its present location in 1978. By an act of the Ohio Legislature (Senate Bill 229) on November 4, 1977, Shawnee State General and Technical College became Shawnee State Community College. Then in 1986, another act of Legislature, put in effect on July 2, created Shawnee State University. Since then, the regional state university in south central Ohio has continued to increase the number of baccalaureate degree programs.

The campus, which began with a single, five-story, classroom building, has expanded to include 29 buildings, the newest being the Children's Learning Center. A master plan created by Bohm-NBBJ of Columbus, Ohio, with input from Shawnee State and Portsmouth area community members, has created the vision for the institution's growth.

To accommodate the diverse educational needs of an expanding student population, Shawnee State's academic curriculum has continued to grow. The University now offers associate degrees in 22 programs, baccalaureate degrees in 46 programs, licensure in teacher education, two Master's degree programs, and is in the process of developing additional majors. Additionally, the Continuing Education Department annually provides learning opportunities to approximately 7,000 community participants. Programs geared toward academically talented young people have proven more popular year after year. In the fall of 2009-2010, a total of 4,300 undergraduate and graduate students attended Shawnee State University, of which 83% attended full-time, and 59% of which were women.

The University has also grown in importance and sphere of influence in other ways as well by offering high quality cultural and educational events to students and the community at large.

Shawnee State University is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, and is part of the University System of Ohio.

2.2 Location

Shawnee State University is located in downtown Portsmouth, Scioto County, Ohio and is accessible by automobile from all sections of the state of Ohio, as well as northern Kentucky. Passenger service of all kinds connects Portsmouth with Columbus, Cincinnati, Dayton, and Cleveland, Ohio, as well as Ashland and Maysville, Kentucky and Huntington, West Virginia. The Portsmouth Regional Airport is nearby, as well as Amtrak in nearby South Shore, Kentucky. Portsmouth, a city of approximately 21,000, is located 90 miles south of Columbus on the Ohio River.

2.3 Facilities

The University maintains 29 buildings, of which Massie Hall is the oldest. Massie Hall was built in 1967 and renovated in 1997 as part of the University's expansion efforts. Renovation of Kricker Hall, the home of the Business Administration Department, was completed in 2001-2002.

The Clark Memorial Library contains over 100,000 bound volumes, and is a charter member of OhioLINK. The Library offers electronic catalogs and research databases, interlibrary loan service, and is a member of the U. S. Government Depository program. Other high-tech offerings include seminar rooms with teleconferencing availability, PC and Macintosh workstations, and Web connectivity. There are also workstations with oversize monitors, video magnifiers, speech synthesizers, and adaptive keyboards.

For cultural purposes, the Vern Riffe Center for the Arts houses both a performing arts wing and a fine arts wing. The Center is home for both academic arts studies as well as a community gathering place for concerts and theater.

The James A. Rhodes Athletic Center, nicknamed "The Cave," is a modern athletics facility that houses a weight room, swimming pool, racquetball courts, and other activities.

The newly renovated University Center serves as the hub of student life at Shawnee State University. The University Center is home to the Bears' Den Cafeteria, student lounges, a game room, and clubs and organizations. In addition, the University Center houses the Offices of the Registrar, Financial Aid, Admissions, Counseling and Psychological Services, Career and Placement Services, Student Activities, Housing and Residence Life, Student Senate, Student Programming Board, the Bursar, and the Vice President for Student Affairs.

The University Information Services, located in Massie Hall, provides Shawnee State University with powerful, flexible, university computer facilities located across campus.
